According to EU Kids Online, Turkey is teggorized as a "low use, low risk" country. Moreover, among all European countries, Tshrkparents have the lowest levels of internet use and are thealst knowledgeable about thetelmet. Since many Turkish children are heavily dependent on out-of-teointernet access, parents may not be able to regulate their children's online activities. Compared to other European countries, Turkish children are also theast knowledgeable about safer Internet usage skills. Furthermore, 9-12 year olds registeermselves on Facebooks older than they really are in violation of Facebook policend U.S. law governing the age at which individuals can provide prate information about themselves without parental consent. Because of their lack of interrskill and understanding of privacy issues, they generally leave their parcy settings on default values.

Turkish children and their families need educational initiatives to improve internet safety skills as well as digital literacyists. These initiatives should be provided not only by the government but also by NGOs, the media, and all educational institutions, including universities. Easy to use softwatels, instructional materials, and online Web portals for safer internet use mustpleevided by internetservice providers and other organizations at no cost to pareritse Ministry of Education must include essential internet-related internet into the curriculum.

Unfortunately, today in Turkey, governmeetforts have been focused on restricting access to achieve the goal of creating arsiaternet. These restrictions are applied through broad, though, disproportionate and tarty use of existing legal measures,
