

ASSIGNMENTS AND PROJECTS*

Scholar-activist Giovanna DiChiro describes "life-writing" as a genre "embodied in personal struggles and life choices" that endow a sense of "hope." Within the context of climate change, life-writing can be a powerful way to see ourselves as "social and environmental change agents" rather than passive observers, deniers, or cynics. Throughout the semester, you'll keep a journal recording your reactions to class readings and discussions and your thoughts on how you might become a social and environmental change agent through daily practices, civic engagement, and your professional trajectory.

Once during the during the semester you'll pair up with a fellow student to lead class discussion for 20 minutes. You'll develop a handout and talking points and engage in dialogue with fellow students. <u>Guidelines will be provided.</u>

To foster an atmosphere of community, co-learning, and mutual aid, a key component of this class will be Community Points. You can receive Community Points in a variety of ways, including:
